William is often playfully referred to as the Mayor of Courson Park. He knows everyone. Nine times out of ten, when a new person arrives to join the AVHG fellowship in the park on Tuesdays and Thursdays, they will say, "William invited me".

William has been an active participant at AVHG park fellowship times since the beginning of the year. Additionally, he's at the park on weekends during ministry times with The Highlands & Desert Vineyard. "A lot of people help our community and I want to come to help too," he adds. Without complaint or hesitation, William is always one of the first people to help unload tables and chairs from the RV, as well as anything else needed to start the fellowship time in the park. He is pretty quiet about it too – never seeks fanfare or recognition.

What William had not thought about until it was recently brought to his attention, is that his quiet, faithful service to the people in his own community is *inspired* by God and *used* by God to be a model for others to follow. "I hadn't thought of it like that, " he says softly.

A week before Light of the Desert opened, William showed up with a group of men from the community to paint the children's classroom and the fellowship hall. A week before a group from Desert Winds Community Church went to build a home in Mexico William was there with others from the community helping to build the frame of the structure.

When he's told that God has given him the qualities of a leader and the initiative to get a job done, he ponders the words quietly. While doing so he's told, "We thank God for you, William. We love you. Jesus loves you." His response is sincere, "Thank you for loving me. I love you guys too."

Thanksgiving Day In The Park ~ Opportunity To Serve

Thursday, November 24^{th} is Thanksgiving Day and just like every Thursday, AVHG disciples of hope will be at Courson Park from 10 - 12 p.m.

Praise God that most of the folks from the park fellowship group have families and homes where they plan to be on Thanksgiving. But through various conversations with friends in the park, it's clear that not everyone has a family or friends with whom to gather ... or a home in which to retreat.

"The beauty of the time in the park has never been about the food," explains Sandy. Thankfulness

Ten men were ill with a horrid disease. There was no treatment available. No doctor who could provide any possibility for help. They were hopeless, not to mention in a lot of pain. Their disease caused open sores on their bodies; sometimes people with this disease lost their fingers! What they had was contagious so they lived isolated away from family & friends. Imagine living in this state. No help. No hope. Deep pain. Who could blame these guys for being depressed? You could say they were the living dead; living simply to die.

Our world is filled with people who are in similar situations. They're *surviving* more than living. Some are ill ~ mentally; physically. Others are wounded emotionally. No one offers help. Or hope. Most of these people are depressed because they're isolated and feel forgotten. Some mask or numb their pain with drugs, alcohol or angry personalities. They are the walking dead of our days. Perhaps you are one of these people. Perhaps you know others like this. There is hope for all of us, dear ones. Jesus said that He came to give life and to give it abundantly. (John 10:10) He said it and

proved it by dying on

the cross as payment for

our sin, so that everyone who believes He is the Son of God will never have to fear death or isolation. (John 3:16) His love replaces sorrow & anger with joy & peace. His love binds up broken hearts. Jesus is love. He had compassion on the ten men and did what no one else could. He gave them new life. The story in Luke 17 tells that only one of the men thanked Jesus. Can you imagine? He gave them each life ~ and only one said thank you. Jesus died and was resurrected for you & for me. Let's pause & say thank you right now, shall we? He's attentive right now. Everyday is Thanksgiving Day.

AVHG Launches Night Shift On Tuesday Nights



On Tuesday, November 15th, AVHG is launching its new NIGHT shift. From 7 – 9 p.m. a group of volunteers will drive in the RV to various locations throughout the AV to distribute cups of noodles, hot cocoa, blankets and jackets to individuals who are homeless.

The night shifts were an inspiration by an AVHG friend who is currently homeless. She met disciples of hope while at Reynolds Park in Lancaster five months ago. Since then, this gal has been faithfully fulfilling the requirements of her alcohol rehab treatment program.

Recently when asked what she would like prayer for, she sobbed as she asked for prayer for her friends who are living on the streets, still caught up in the bondage of drugs and alcohol. "One of them didn't wake up in the morning because he froze to death," she cried. "I'm doing everything I can to get off the streets and I want them to know there's hope too," she added.

In that moment the prayers started – asking God to make AVHG part of the hope to be shared with others who are homeless. "We are inspired by churches like Desert Vineyard and Oasis who faithfully serve the homeless," say Seth and Sandy. God bless them for all they do to show Christ's love.

The hope is that relationships will be established as we visit with the same people weekly. Relationship evangelism is how God moves through AVHG.

The Tuesday night shift will also provide opportunity for people to serve who are not free during the days. Meeting time is 7 pm at Courson Park in Palmdale.
